## 7. Trustee Report:

Karin: Discussing board priorities and goals, things we would like to see, budget considerations, strategic planning. Not yet fully approved. More discussion needs to happen. It takes time for all to come to the same conclusions. Admin working on budget for the upcoming school year, board meeting planned to review further. Final budget meeting planned for May 5<sup>th</sup> but have until May 31 to submit the final budget. Anxious to hear opinions on proposed curriculum.

#### 8. New Business

- a. COVID: any thoughts, open discussion: HPSD seems good, HP school may have outbreak. All in all good in comparison to other schools.
  Pam –we have experienced that our students and staff are honest. That helps a lot, so they tell us if they have testing or if they are a contact.
  Because AHS cannot keep up. That's made a difference.
- b. New Curriculum:

Alyssa –question –after releasing the curriculum, then what happens? Karin -Schools pilot it. Some schools are against that because they are not in support of it. HPSD have not yet met to discuss their opinion on the draft.

Tara –who decides about the piloting? Karin –it is not a school board decision. Maybe administration would know more. Have school staff been approached? –Darby –we are asked to give feedback at this point, that's all. Taryn –would HPSD as a whole take a stance? Or each school has the ability to decide? Karin –as far as I know it's a decision for the schools and not the whole division.

Tara –concerns with new curriculum:

Pauline –if parents have concerns with curriculum –what is best course of action? Karin –best place to send concerns is MLA and Minister of Education. We at the HPSD do not have a voice with this.

Pauline –I know it doesn't affect JPV and high school now, but won't that be next? Shouldn't we all be checked in?

Monique –yes it would have to be. The outcomes move and it's a ripple effect. So yes it will affect them.

Tara —last year at the end of grade 7 the children were learning about Canadian history including Rupert's Land. Which is all the way down in grade 2. Start local and then spread out was how I thought it always was and not to learn about other cultures in the younger grades.

Nichole —I think it is interesting to learn about other cultures in the younger grades. Don't like the duplication idea. But feel interesting to keep the kids engaged by sprinkling in other cultures.

Tara-there has been a lot of drafts before, what is different in this one? I wish I had kept the previous one so that I could compare.

Pauline –I went in 2018/2019 –the NDP invited parents to come. Parents had more flexibility. Built onto their skills. Lots of documents out there, they do compare previous drafts with this one. Can send out doc in email.

Tara: Resolution P05: Now do you still agree that we should hurry the new curriculum up or put on hold.

Nichole –put on hold.

Pam –two separate issues, 1. Hold because of covid vs 2. People are in disagreement with this curriculum. We don't want to pilot something we don't agree with.

A few parents at COSC meeting shared view of putting the pilot program on hold for this resolution.

Pauline agrees and it's not a covid thing, it is just a terrible curriculum Carolyn —it just needs to be worked more, there are some good things in this curriculum and some bad things, we need to re-work it and pilot it and then pilot it again.

Karin –community hat: social study section seems to be where most people had concerns. Appreciated seeing financial literacy introduced into each grade. Kids need to understand numbers in economy and financial implications.

Tara reading from the P05 resolution.

Karin —submit proposal to eliminate the aspect of tying it to the covid pandemic. You can support as a school council all but that one point. Just because it is written that way now does not mean it has to stay that way.

Tara: ok will agree with that resolution now if re-worked.

Taryn: everything that's been said –agree. The lack of voice. Social studies piece stands out. Teachers feel not heard, left out, we should be a part of the conversation. Instead of piloting it needs conversation and molding

and input from the fields connected. Open to feedback. Teachers are ready to do what's best and take things on.

Tara –lack of respect in a way.

Carolyn –from a secondary perspective –social studies -hard to take and opinion on some of this because I don't know where it is going. Don't know what the expectation will be for 7-12. If could see it all could see where they were going with it and then form an opinion.

Democracy can be taught in grade 2 yes –but it needs to come back later for further in depth learning.

Scope and sequence would help me form an opinion as a secondary teacher.

Social studies –liked how it was done in lower elementary grades and then in higher grades source analysis. A lot of good stuff in our current curriculum, don't want to see it ruined, want to see it improved.

Taryn –in grade one, we are all about our local community and they are understanding they are a part of Alberta. It is great. Good parts there now.

Tara: would it be helpful for the school council to write a letter? Nichole –says to leave it up to the individual. That way if we feel passionate about it we can take action. Appreciate the feedback from this group and discussion.

Tara –any letter written and the survey online would all be helpful to do. Karin –as the HPSD having that concrete information from letters is helpful. Board meeting next Wednesday.

Taryn -Laura is open to teachers offering feedback.

If you are going to write a letter send before Wednesday so that you have the information for the discussion at that meeting.
