ABOUT US

Georges P. Vanier School is centrally located in the village of Donnelly within the Municipal District of Smoky River No. 130. It is located near the intersection of Highway 2 and Highway 49, located approximately 65 km south of Peace River and 427 km northwest of Edmonton.

We are a 7-12 school, offering dual-track programming in French Immersion and English for students in grades 7 to 9 with a full array of courses for our senior high students. Our school has a student population of approximately 240 students and is situated in the heart of northwestern Alberta's Smoky River region. We pride ourselves on the small school with big city programing. This is an area of approximately 5,000 residents and is predominantly driven by the agriculture sector as well as the oil and gas industry.

We are also pleased to see an increase of 53% in parental input to the assurance survey for this year. This added input will increase the validity of the data and we will work to address the areas needing growth.

COMMENTS

Areas of strength in the Provincial Achievement Test results include the acceptable level for ELA-9 and Science 9 where we were slightly ahead of the provincial average. We continue to pursue avenues to support numeracy not only at the grade 9 level, but throughout all of the grades. We are working closely with the numeracy leads to advance best practices in this area. The French Language Arts results are weak with a limited number of students. We have a returning teacher this year and will work to improve results with consistency in the program.

COMMENTS

The low results in both English Language Arts and Social Studies demand a closer look at our assessment practices as well as the use of the RCAT and HLAT data to improve instructional practices. We are also seeking out Professional Development specifically designed to address the identified weaknesses in students' writing and reading comprehension skills. There may also be consideration for aligning student skills with the particular stream they choose, which is indicated by a dip in both humanity courses. We are also utilizing diploma prep courses for students this semester.

The Mathematics teachers at Georges P. Vanier are working closely with the numeracy leads and the numeracy coordinator to address learner needs as we develop a numeracy framework. Utilizing a consistent numeracy tool to benchmark student progress will be the initial goal in this measure, as well as accessing divisional staff such as the Numeracy Lead and Curriculum Coordinator to support teachers in this area.

The 2024/25 school year has teachers of all curriculum diving into the data of these universal screens to establish trends within the areas of concern/growth. Subject groups are making commitments and measures to the areas identified during PD days. All subject areas are working together to support numeracy as it embeds itself in all pedagogy. This will be a continued area of focus for teachers and PD for the next few school years are we look to improve overall student numeracy skills.

COMMENTS

Although there is a decline in the satisfaction rating for students and parents, there is no indication as to what qualities with which they are dissatisfied. The staff has remained largely unchanged, and the focus continues to be on quality instruction with meaningful assessment. We will explore ways to better understand student and parent dissatisfaction in this area with focused conversations with stakeholders.

ASSURANCE DOMAIN: TEACHING AND LEADING - LOCAL COMPONENT

PROFESSIONAL LEARNING, SUPERVISION AND EVALUATION

The staff of Georges P. Vanier School are engaged in a variety of professional learning opportunities, including division-wide initiatives focused on interleaving, spiralling curriculum, interpretations of literacy assessments and strategies supporting student learning related to literacy and numeracy. The area of focus is on hard data provided to us via universal screens and PAT/DIP results. Staff have spent Professional Development days examining trends in the data in all subject areas. Teachers have worked in subject teams to determine short-term goals/commitments/measures to improve pedagogy, assessment and student achievement.

With respect to supervision and evaluation, the administration team, Principal, Vice Principal, and Learning Support Teacher, are involved in regular formal and informal supervision on all teachers in the school ensuring a consistency in programming, planning, and assessment practices.

As well, the Vice Principal is involved in coaching and mentoring new teachers with regular visits to their classrooms and support in the development of curricular knowledge, long-range/unit/daily planning, assessment practices and classroom management practices. Observation and walkthroughs allow for debrief conversations. This gives the teachers reflection opportunity and to make commitments that can be measured by themselves. Supervision and support to help the teachers reach these goals follows.

The Principal is engaged in the formal evaluation process for 3 teaching staff. Two teachers are seeking a permanent teaching certificate, and one is on a probationary contract. The evaluation process consists of regular classroom visits, both planned and impromptu, with debriefing sessions following each visit. The evaluation process follows the TQS document and reflects all six dimensions regarding teaching standards.

COMMENTS

While this assurance measure is multifaceted, it is challenging to recognize the rationale for the declining trend in this area. Staff work diligently to provide welcoming learning environments, and we have reimagined the use of the entire school by moving classes to rooms to accommodate class size, accessibility to resources, and programming. Staff also engage in regularly connecting with students as they enter and leave the building by greeting them and connecting with students on a daily basis.

Although the building itself is aging, and furniture in many learning environments is dated and needs replacement, teachers are consistently working to develop the ergonomics of their classrooms to promote engagement and create pleasant learning spaces.

While there have been changes mandated at the division level to improve safety, such as the installation of detectors in bathroom and change room areas, and a front doorbell and camera, these additions may be perceived as indicators of issues instead of preventative measures.

We will work to better understand dissatisfaction in this measure and advocate for improvement in this measure.

ACCESS TO A CONTINUUM OF SUPPORTS AND SERVICES

HPSD supports inclusion through a multi-tiered approach. All students have a continuum of needs that can be met, to a varying degree, by differentiated instruction. School-based Learning Support Teachers (LSTs) engage in coaching conversations with staff regarding the ways and means of supporting a differentiated program of studies.

Each HPSD school annually reviews their response to intervention, inclusive of:

- the universal, targeted, and intensive supports available,
- the process by which teachers collaborate to implement strategies,
- support networks for updates about student progression,
- display their continuum of supports in a designated area where staff have easy access.

FIRST NATION, MÉTIS, AND INUIT PROGRAMMING (INDIGENOUS EDUCATION COACHES)

The Indigenous Education Coaching team employs a universal education model. The goal of this model is for all students to have a deep understanding of our Canadian history, including Indigenous cultures, perspectives, Treaties and Land agreements, the Legacy of Residential Schools, and the contributions of Indigenous Culture in shaping our Canadian identity.

This model supports all staff in meeting the Teaching Quality Standard (TQS) #5 through professional development sessions designed to build the capacity of our teachers to accurately and confidently deliver Indigenous materials in their classrooms. They are moving future generations forward in creating a more inclusive Canada. A continued and focused area for the Indigenous Education Team is to promote and advance calls to action in Truth and Reconciliation.

This model allows Indigenous learners to see themselves reflected in the curriculum. Classroom content across subject areas from Kindergarten to Grade 12 will be respectful, authentic, and genuine and will include consultations with Elders and Knowledge Keepers within our local context.

The decline in this measure may be due to a lack of good messaging to parents about the in-house efforts of the school to support individual student learning, such as targeted interventions identified through universal screening tools, the use of differentiated strategies by teachers to meet student learning needs, supports supplied by the LST in the form of educational assistant deployment, resource procurement, and lesson support. Implementation of the study hall program has also supported this effort.

While school-level elements are part of the solution, divisional-level restructuring will improve access to supports such as Ed psych and counselling services in the future.
